| Health REQUIRED (Pair with a course below) | Health is a semester course which will cover mental health, human growth, body systems, nutrition, chemical dependency, STD's and family planning. Emphasis will be on long term lifestyle changes to promote a long and healthy life. The curriculum includes: Personal Safety awareness, Mental Illness, the relationship between Diet and Disease, an investigation of Communicable Diseases, the critical components of a Healthy Pregnancy, and a broad overview of Family Planning Methods. This course will provide 5 units of Health. | 5 | No |
| Prod 301/Life \& Career Planning | Introduces students to a decision-making process that will help them envision and plan for a future career that is productive, achievable, and stimulating. This course culminates with the development of a 10-year career/education plan used for advisory and academic purposes. This personalized 10-year plan provides students with the focus and intrinsic motivation to succeed in high school, college, at work, and in life. | 5 | No |
| Leadership Intro to ASB | This class is designed specifically for freshman students only. Leadership skills are developed through participation in the planning and implementation of a variety of student and staff activities. | 5 | No |

| Ag <br> Mechanics | This class is designed to make students aware that an advanced educational background is necessary to pursue a career in agriculture repair or general farming. | Choir, Varsity | Varsity Choir is open to all students in all grades. This is "the" school choir. This course is designed to develop the 4- part choral sound, sight reading skills, ability to hold their part against others, and cappella music. This choir does multiple concerts each year. | Culinary <br> Arts 1 | Culinary Arts 1 is designed to provide students with the competencies needed in the areas of food and nutrition. Students must provide appropriate attire as outlined in the band handbook. | 10 | "f" |

| Marimba Band | Marimba Band is a year-long, performing music ensemble class. Traditional and contemporary music from Latin America with an emphasis on Mexican music genres will be explored along with performance skills. Students will participate in public performances both on and off campus. This class allows students from all backgrounds to experience and understand dance as a component of the Mexican heritage. | 10 | "f" |
| Music Theory | This course is designed to prepare students for advanced ensemble and matriculation to university level music programs. Students will sight sing, take melodic dictation, and write music compositions and arrangements. | 10 | "f" |
| Photo 1 | This "hands-on" course provides training and experience in the basic to intermediate technical and artistic elements of photography. Students learn/use professional-level camera features to develop their compositional and technical skills. Students will use a variety of techniques to refine and present their photographs. Throughout the process students see, critique, and learn from the best of the world's photographs, as well participating in displays of student work. | 10 | "f" |
| Songwriting <br> \& Music <br> Production | In this "hands-on" course, students will compose and record songs and other forms of music. They will learn about music theory, composition, arrangement, the history of song, instrumental performance, signing and lyric writing. Students will learn and utilize music recording equipment and software. Students who have no prior skills in songwriting, playing an instrument, or singing are welcome, but must receive instructor approval and will be expected to adequately develop one or more of those skills during the year. | 10 | "f" |
| Spanish 1 | Students in this course will learn how to communicate about themselves, their family, their friends, and their interests. Students will be exposed to information about various Spanish-speaking cultures. Students work individually, in partnerships, and in groups to produce simple dialogues. Students are expected to gradually improve their skills so that they can respond in Spanish only. | 10 | "e" |
| Spanish for Sp. Speakers, Intro. | This course will prepare Spanish speakers to be successful in subsequent Spanish for Spanish speaking courses. Students are fully immersed in a Spanish speaking academic environment. Instruction will address all areas of reading skill including phonemic awareness, vocabulary development, reading comprehension, grammar and writing. Struggling Spanish speakers will gain confidence through relevant and authentic activities. | 10 | "e" |
| Theatre <br> Arts 1 | This course will introduce the basic skills of theatre arts in four major content areas: acting, theatre history, play reading \& playwriting and technical theatre/career applications. Students will develop performance skills, gain an understanding of the theatre in historical context, utilize creative writing skills and be introduced to set design, costuming and make-up. | 10 | "f" |
| Video/Film, Intro | This course is designed to introduce students to the art of filmmaking and video production. Students will learn filmmaking techniques using the camera, computer and various software as tools to tell stories through sound and visuals. | Ag Welding 1 | This course focuses on theory, practice and application of various metal joining processes, including oxy-fuel welding, brazing, flame cutting, electric are processes and an introduction to mig welding. Students will develop competencies in shop and tool safety. Students will have the opportunity to build their own BBQ pit. Taking class enables the student to participate in FFA activities. | 10 | No |
| Ag Bldg. \& Construction | This course introduces students to hand and machine woodworking equipment, methods and materials while constructing a variety of wood projects. Projects will include bird houses, butcher blocks, furniture and decorative wood projects. Casework, door and drawer construction are also explored. Class is $40 \%$ lecture and $60 \%$ activity. | 10 | No |
| Band, Beginning | This class provides an opportunity for students to begin instrumental study. It is especially valuable to those who have not had a previous opportunity. Students may have the opportunity to move up to the Marching/Concert band if the student receives the band director's recommendation. | 10 | No |
| Chorale A/B | Chorale is a beginning course for students interested in choral music. This course develops basic music skills, basic music vocabulary and beginning sight reading. Students will learn about breathing, pitch and tone, vowel sounds, diction and how to follow a part in written music. This group sings in all the concerts. This course may be repeated until ready to audition for Varsity Choir and Madrigals. | 10 | No |
| Madrigals | Madrigals is an audition-only course for all students with advanced music training and exceptional talent. If possible, students should be concurrently enrolled in Varsity Choir. | 10 | No |
